Shelter Happenings

We are happy to announce that this year has been great so far in taking in and adopting out dogs. So far we have averaged 23 adoptions per month. In March and April we took in 42 dogs: 24 owner turn ins, 2 strays and 16 came from Pueblo Animal Services. We directly adopted out 36 dogs and did 12 agency transfers - 10 went to the prison dog program as reported on in the last newsletter and 2 Blue Heelers found homes after they went to New Hope Cattle Dog Rescue. We count these agency transfers as adoptions. Also, four big but good dogs that had been with us for a year or more got homes.

This is the time of year for puppies and many strays. The City shelter gets very overcrowded. In May, we have taken in a lot of dogs including 13 puppies from PAS. We saved a wonderful German Shepard (He has a great home.) and a friendly young dog that had been injured from being euthanized because of the overcrowding. PAS has been grateful for our help in saving dogs' lives.

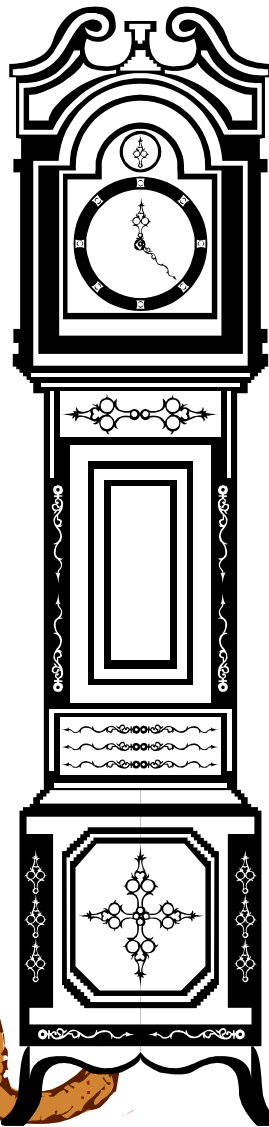

The staff, Board and especially Bill & Shirley Hurley were very saddened by the death of Shupa, our oldest resident. She has been with us since 1993 and came in as an adult dog. Bill and Shirley walked Shupa and Rocco for over 10 years. We trust Shupa and Rocco are romping together again on the other side of the rainbow bridge.

Thanks to all of you who made donations from the last wish list.

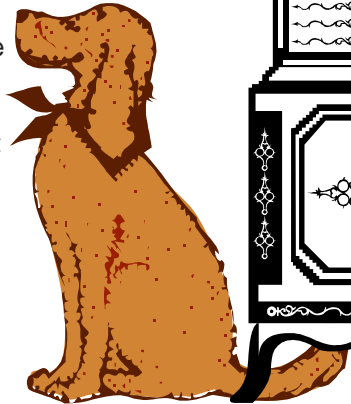

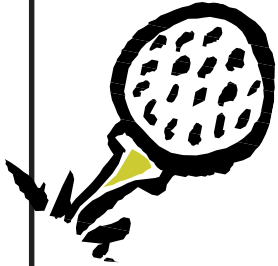

Lost Your Pet What You Should Know

The following is part of an article written by **Kathy "Kat" Albrecht** that appeared in the Summer 2005, Volume 4, Issue 3 of the **Paws to Think** magazine, a publication of **The Pet Savers Foundation**. The author is a former police detective ... and author of "THE LOST PET CHRONICLES: ADVENTURES OF AK-9 COPTURNED PET DETECTIVE."

(Continued from the last newsletter on issues that influence the distances lost dogs travel.)

CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING THE DISAPPEARANCE A dog that digs out from a yard to explore a scent will tend to travel a short distance before it is found - meandering and doubling back as it explores the scent. On the other hand, a dog that bolts in panic ... will take off at a blind run and can run for several miles. **WEATHER** A dog that escapes on a beautiful spring day may travel farther than one that escapes in a snow storm. ... **TERRAIN** A dog that escapes in a residential area will not travel as far as a dog that escapes in a mountainous area. Fences that create barriers will influence a dog's travel since a dog will take the "path of least resistance" when traveling. (Natural barriers like cliffs) ... influence whether a dog continues on a path or changes directions.

APPEARANCE OF THE DOG What a dog looks like can influence how quickly it will be picked up by a rescuer. In general, most people are less inclined to pull over and attempt to grab a loose Pit Bull they perceive as being "aggressive" than they would a "friendly" wiggly Labrador retriever. Also, size matters: people are more inclined to pick up small dogs - they look vulnerable and are easier to transport and house than large dogs. In addition, people are more likely to attempt to rescue a purebred dog that they perceive to have value than a mixed breed dog trotting down the sidewalk. Their impression is often that the dog belongs in the neighborhood or that it is a homeless stray. But when those same people see a Boston Terrier, they are inclined to believe that, because it is a "valuable purebred dog," it must be a lost pet. *(Next issue will cover HUMAN BEHAVIORS - owners & Rescuers)*

In Loving Memory of Peanut

(Editor's note: This was sent in by Chikota, an elementary student. Only spelling has been changed.)

Both of us were two peas in a pod. Peanut was my kitten, and I loved her ways of getting my attention by grabbing my shoes or sitting on my head like a hat. She was maybe 8 inches and was a milky white with brown and tan spots. We had gotten her from a shelter a few weeks before it happened. She was ornery and bouncy. She loved to be the center of attention. It had only been a few weeks of fun. Peanut seemed to be getting heavier by the minute. She seemed drained of her

energy. My mom had taken her into the vet when we got the bad news. Peanut had F.I.P. It was Feline Intestinal Peritonitis, a disease where fluid fills the lungs and body. It was an incurable disease. I planned a party for her that next day, but it was too late. During class that next day I was called to the office. My mom was waiting for me outside and when I opened the door to the truck, there lay Peanut all cooped in a towel held by my step dad. I cried all the way to the vet's office holding her. As we entered, it seemed as if the doctor knew what was wrong. He gave me three choices, one they could remove the fluids but she would die faster, two let her stay like this, and three put her to sleep. I didn't want her to suffer. As the doctor injected her I watched still holding her in my hands. On the way home she moved and then died. Her eyes shut. She died in my arms that day. Now, we would only meet in heaven. Those last two weeks when she was alive I'll never forget. It sometimes puzzles us why someone so young leaves us so soon. Some fulfill their purpose soon and others take a lifetime. Even though Peanut died her purpose was not finished for it still lives on today.
